COVID-19 Prevention Program (CPP) for Williams Unified School District

This CPP is designed to control exposures to the SARS-CoV-2 virus that may occur in our workplace.

Date: 8/18/2021(Updated)

Authority and Responsibility

Sandra Ayón, Ed.D., Superintendent, has overall authority and responsibility for implementing the provisions of this CPP in our workplace. In addition, all managers and supervisors are responsible for implementing and maintaining the CPP in their assigned work areas and for ensuring employees receive answers to questions about the program in a language they understand.

All employees are responsible for using safe work practices, following all directives, policies and procedures, and assisting in maintaining a safe work environment.

Identification and Evaluation of COVID-19 Hazards

We will implement the following in our workplace:

- Conduct workplace-specific evaluations using the Appendix A: Identification of COVID-19
 Hazards form.
- Document the vaccination status of our employees which is maintained as a confidential medical record.
- Evaluate employees' potential workplace exposures to all persons at, or who may enter, our workplace.
- COVID-19 policies and procedures will be maintained to respond effectively and immediately to
 individuals at the workplace who are a COVID-19 case to prevent or reduce the risk of transmission
 in the workplace.
- Review applicable orders and general and industry-specific guidance from the State of California, Cal/OSHA, and the local health department related to COVID-19 hazards and prevention.
- Evaluate existing COVID-19 prevention controls in our workplace and the need for different or additional controls.
- Conduct periodic inspections using the Appendix B: COVID-19 Inspections form as needed to
 identify unhealthy conditions, work practices, and work procedures related to COVID-19 and to
 ensure compliance with our COVID-19 policies and procedures.

Employee participation

Employees and their authorized employees' representatives are encouraged to participate in the identification and evaluation of COVID-19 hazards by communicating any suggestions or concerns with administration.

Employee and Students screening

Employees and students of WUSD are required to complete a self-health screening daily following CDPH guidelines. Stay home when sick and avoid close contact with others.

Employees are required to be vaccinated or submit to weekly testing (October 15, 2021; State Mandate).

Correction of COVID-19 Hazards

Unsafe or unhealthy work conditions, practices or procedures will be documented on the **Appendix B: COVID-19 Inspections** form, and corrected in a timely manner based on the severity of the hazards, as follows:

- The severity of the hazard will be assessed and correction time frames will be assigned.
- Superintendent and Director of Fiscal Services are identified as being responsible for timely correction.
- Follow-up measures are taken to ensure timely correction.

Control of COVID-19 Hazards

Physical Distancing

The objective of physical distancing is to reduce the likelihood of contact that may lead to transmission and has been a widely used strategy during the pandemic. While this does not continue to be a mandate, staff and students will be mindful of the space between each other while talking, eating, etc.

Face Coverings

WUSD will provide clean, undamaged face coverings and ensure employees properly wear them over the nose and mouth when indoors and where required by orders from the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) or local health department. All staff and students will be provided face covering by the District. All students will be supplied two cloth school related coverings and each office will have disposable masks for students who forget to bring a face covering to campus. All staff will be provided both masks and face shields. Masks shall be worn while indoors by anyone on campus.

The following are exceptions to the use of face coverings in our workplace:

- When an employee is alone in a room.
- While eating and drinking at the workplace, provided employees are at least six feet apart and outside air supply to the area, if indoors, has been maximized to the extent possible.
- Employees who cannot wear face coverings due to a medical or mental health condition or disability, or who are hearing-impaired or communicating with a hearing-impaired person. Alternatives will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
- Specific tasks that cannot feasibly be performed with a face covering. This exception is limited to the time in which such tasks are being performed.

Any employee not wearing a face covering, face shield with a drape or other effective alternative, for any reason, shall maintain a distance from others as practicable for the situation.

We will not prevent any employee from wearing a face covering when it is not required unless it would create a safety hazard such as interfering with the safe operation of equipment.

Engineering controls

WUSD will implement the following measures for situations where we cannot maintain at least six feet between individuals: Plexiglass barriers have been installed in district areas where six feet cannot be maintained.

We maximize, to the extent feasible, the quantity of outside air for our buildings with mechanical or natural ventilation systems by:

- All HVAC units have MERV-10 filters. MERV-13 filters are on back order and will replace MERV-10 filters when received.
- All HVAC units have been converted to bring in as much outside return air as the units allow.
- HVAC systems have been overridden allowing doors and windows to remain open while in use.

Cleaning and disinfecting

Strict cleaning and disinfecting protocols will be in place throughout the school campuses. In classrooms, teachers, and students will have access to Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approved materials to maintain the cleanliness of their environment. Additionally, teachers will be provided with paper towels and spray bottles of an EPA approved disinfectant. All teachers will be trained in the proper use of cleaners and disinfectants.

Custodians will be cleaning classrooms daily. Custodians will be cleaning and disinfecting other high use areas throughout the campus such as outdoor lunch tables, restrooms, etc. throughout the day. Regular nightly cleaning includes emptying of all interior and exterior trash by the night custodial staff. Cleaning and disinfecting all restrooms. Prioritizing sanitizing/disinfecting* desktops, table tops, door handles, push plates and light switches in classrooms and common areas. As time allows, we will perform floor care (vacuum, sweep, or mop). *Desk tops and tabletops will be sprayed with disinfectant daily.

In the case of a COVID-19 positive report: Sites will create a work order with classrooms/areas affected, which includes when the room/area was last occupied to schedule the disinfect cleaning to be done 24 hours after last occupation per CDC recommendation. Custodians will disinfect touch points on hard surfaces such as student desks, hard chairs or stools, file cabinets, cabinets doors (around the handle area), sink handles, and tables. Custodians will clean hard surfaces in work areas/stations and any technology related items that are high touch such as phones, keyboards, mice, and printers. If there are other items which are high touch in the classroom then it should be noted on the work order to be cleaned. Once completed, communication will be confirmed back to the site through completing the work order as resolved.

Shared tools, equipment and personal protective equipment (PPE)

PPE must not be shared, e.g., gloves, goggles, masks and face shields.

Items that employees come in regular physical contact with, such as phones, headsets, desks, keyboards, writing materials, instruments and tools must also not be shared, to the extent feasible. Where there must be sharing, the items will be disinfected between uses by students and staff that last used it, using Oxivir wipes and spray.

Sharing of vehicles will be minimized to the extent feasible, and high-touch points (for example, steering wheel, door handles, seatbelt buckles, armrests, shifter, etc.) will be disinfected between users.

Hand sanitizing

In order to implement effective hand sanitizing procedures, WUSD MOT and Administrators will be:

- Evaluating handwashing facilities.
- Determining the need for additional facilities.
- Encouraging and allowing time for employee handwashing.
- Providing employees with an effective hand sanitizer and prohibit hand sanitizers that contain methanol (i.e. methyl alcohol).
- Providing mobile hand sanitizer station throughout campus.
- Encouraging students and staff to wash their hands for at least 20 seconds each time.

Personal protective equipment (PPE) used to control employees' exposure to COVID-19

Administrators will evaluate the need for PPE (such as gloves, goggles, and face shields) as required by CCR Title 8, section 3380, and provide such PPE as needed.

When it comes to respiratory protection, we evaluate the need in accordance with CCR Title 8 section 5144 when the physical distancing requirements are not feasible or maintained

Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases

Employees who had potential COVID-19 exposure in our workplace will be:

- Provided information on testing sites and insurance coverage (employees w/o insurance will be covered by the District)
- The information on benefits described in Training and Instruction, and Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases, below, will be provided to them.

System for Communicating

Our goal is to ensure that we have effective two-way communication with our employees, in a form they can readily understand, and that it includes the following information:

- Employees must report COVID-19 symptoms and possible hazards to their site administrators or supervisors through call, email, or text at the onset of symptoms.
- That employees can report symptoms and hazards without fear of reprisal.
- Our procedures or policies for accommodating employees with medical or other conditions that put them at increased risk of severe COVID-19 illness.
- When testing is not required, how employees can access COVID-19 testing
- In the event we are required to provide testing because of a workplace exposure or outbreak, we will communicate the plan for providing testing and inform affected employees of the reason for the testing and the possible consequences of a positive test.
- Information about COVID-19 hazards employees (including other employers and individuals in contact with our workplace) may be exposed to, what is being done to control those hazards, and our COVID-19 policies and procedures.
- HR will work with employees to provide information for testing, leaves, tracing, and other supports.

Training and Instruction

WUSD MOT and Administrators will provide effective training and instruction that includes:

- The district's COVID-19 policies and procedures to protect employees from COVID-19 hazards.
- Information regarding COVID-19-related benefits to which the employee may be entitled under applicable federal, state, or local laws.
- The fact that:
 - o COVID-19 is an infectious disease that can be spread through the air.
 - o COVID-19 may be transmitted when a person touches a contaminated object and then touches their eyes, nose, or mouth.
 - o An infectious person may have no symptoms.
- The importance of frequent hand washing with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and using hand sanitizer when employees do not have immediate access to a sink or hand washing facility, and that hand sanitizer does not work if the hands are soiled.
- Proper use of face coverings and the fact that face coverings are not respiratory protective
 equipment face coverings are intended to primarily protect other individuals from the wearer of the
 face covering.
- COVID-19 symptoms and the importance of obtaining a COVID-19 test and not coming to work if the employee has COVID-19 symptoms.
- During the 20-21 school year Williams Unified School District staff received the following training:
 - o Coronavirus Awareness: Full Course (July 2020)
 - o Coronavirus: Cleaning and Disinfecting Your Workplace: Full Course (July 2020)
 - Disinfectant Use Training for Full Cabinet, Office Staff and Student Supervisors (October 2020)

Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases

Where WUSD has a COVID-19 case in our workplace, we will limit transmission by:

- Ensuring that COVID-19 cases are excluded from the workplace until our return-to-work requirements are met.
- Excluding employee with COVID-19 exposure from the workplace: CDC provides guidelines to our

local public health authorities who will make the final decisions about how long quarantine should last based on local conditions and needs. Follow the recommendations of our local public health department if you need to quarantine. Options they will consider include stopping quarantine

- After day 10 without testing
- o After day 7 after receiving a negative test result (test must occur on day 5 or later).
- After stopping quarantine, you should:
 - Watch for symptoms until 14 days after exposure.
 - If you have symptoms, immediately self-isolate and contact your local public health authority or healthcare provider.
 - Wear a mask, maintain distance when applicable, wash your hands, avoid crowds, and take other steps to prevent the spread of COVID-19.
 - Continuing and maintaining an employee's earnings, seniority, and all other employee rights and benefits whenever we have demonstrated that the COVID-19 exposure is work related. This will be accomplished by following leave conditions.
- Providing employees at the time of exclusion with information on available benefits.

Reporting, Recordkeeping, and Access

It is the district's policy to:

- Report information about COVID-19 cases at our workplace to the local health department whenever required by law, and provide any related information requested by the local health department.
- Report immediately to Cal/OSHA any COVID-19-related serious illnesses or death, as defined under CCR Title 8 section 330(h), of an employee occurring in our place of employment or in connection with any employment.
- Maintain records of the steps taken to implement our written COVID-19 Prevention Program in accordance with CCR Title 8 section 3203(b).
- Make our written COVID-19 Prevention Program available at the workplace to employees, authorized employee representatives, and to representatives of Cal/OSHA immediately upon request.
- Use the Appendix C: Investigating COVID-19 Cases form to keep a record of and track all COVID-19 cases. The information will be made available to employees, authorized employee representatives, or as otherwise required by law, with personal identifying information removed.
- Notify households upon exposure.

Return-to-Work Criteria

- COVID-19 positive cases with COVID-19 symptoms will not return to work until all the following have occurred:
 - COVID-19 symptoms have improved.
 - o At least 10 days have passed since COVID-19 symptoms first appeared.
- COVID-19 positive cases who tested positive but never developed COVID-19 symptoms will not return to work until a minimum of 10 days have passed since the date of specimen collection of their first positive COVID-19 test.
- A negative test must be required for an employee to return to work if the employee had COVID-19 symptoms or previously tested positive for COVID-19 If an order to isolate or quarantine an employee is issued by a local or state health official, the employee will not return to work until the period of isolation or quarantine is completed or the order is lifted. If no period was specified, then the period will be 10 days from the time, the order to isolate was effective, or 14 days from the time the order to quarantine was effective.

Appendix A: Identification of COVID-19 Hazards

All persons, regardless of symptoms or negative COVID-19 test results, will be considered potentially infectious. Particular attention will be paid to areas where people may congregate or come in contact with one another, regardless of whether employees are performing an assigned work task or not. For example: meetings, entrances, bathrooms, hallways, aisles, walkways, elevators, break or eating areas, cool-down areas, and waiting areas.

Evaluation of potential workplace exposure will be to all persons at the workplace or who may enter the workplace, including coworkers, employees of other entities, members of the public, customers or clients, and independent contractors. We will consider how employees and other persons enter, leave, and travel through the workplace, in addition to addressing fixed work locations.

Appendix C: Investigating COVID-19 Cases

All personal identifying information of COVID-19 cases or symptoms will be kept confidential. All COVID-19 testing or related medical services provided by us will be provided in a manner that ensures the confidentiality of employees, with the exception of unredacted information on COVID-19 cases that will be provided immediately upon request to the local health department, CDPH, Cal/OSHA, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), or as otherwise required by law.

All employees' medical records will also be kept confidential and not disclosed or reported without the employee's express written consent to any person within or outside the workplace, with the following exceptions: (1) Unredacted medical records provided to the local health department, CDPH, Cal/OSHA, NIOSH, or as otherwise required by law immediately upon request; and (2) Records that do not contain individually identifiable medical information or from which individually identifiable medical information has been removed.

Additional Consideration #1

Multiple COVID-19 Infections and COVID-19 Outbreaks

This section of CPP will stay in effect until there are no new COVID-19 cases detected on-site for a 14-day period.

COVID-19 testing

- WUSD will provide COVID-19 testing to all employees in our exposed workplace except for employees who were not present during the period of an outbreak identified by a local health department or the relevant 14-day period. COVID-19 testing will be provided at no cost to employees during employees' working hours.
- COVID-19 testing consists of the following:
 - All employees in the exposed area or those who came into contact with those employees will be immediately tested and then tested again one week later. Negative COVID-19 test results of employees with COVID-19 exposure will not impact the duration of any quarantine period required by, or orders issued by, the local health department.
 - After the first two COVID-19 tests, we will continue to provide COVID-19 testing of employees who remain at the workplace at least once per week, or more frequently if recommended by the local health department, until there are no new COVID-19 cases detected in our workplace for a 14-day period.
 - We will provide additional testing when deemed necessary by Cal/OSHA.

Exclusion of COVID-19 cases

WUSD will ensure COVID-19 cases and employees who had COVID-19 exposure are excluded from the workplace in accordance with our CPP **Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases** and **Return to Work Criteria** requirements, and local health officer orders if applicable.

Investigation of workplace COVID-19 illness

WUSD will immediately investigate and determine possible workplace-related factors that contributed to the COVID-19 outbreak in accordance with our CPP **Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases**.

COVID-19 investigation, review and hazard correction

In addition to our CPP Identification and Evaluation of COVID-19 Hazards and Correction of COVID-19 Hazards, WUSD will immediately perform a review of potentially relevant COVID-19 policies, procedures, and controls and implement changes as needed to prevent further spread of COVID-19.

The investigation and review will be documented and include:

- Investigation of new or unabated COVID-19 hazards including:
 - District leave policies and practices and whether employees are discouraged from remaining home when sick.
 - District COVID-19 testing policies.
 - Insufficient outdoor air.
 - Insufficient air filtration.
 - Lack of physical distancing.
- Updating the review:
 - Every thirty days that the outbreak continues.
 - o In response to new information or to new or previously unrecognized COVID-19 hazards.
 - When otherwise necessary.
- Implementing changes to reduce the transmission of COVID-19 based on the investigation and review. Administrators will consider:
 - Moving indoor tasks outdoors or having them performed remotely.

- o Increasing outdoor air supply when work is done indoors.
- Improving air filtration.
- o Increasing physical distancing as much as possible.
- Respiratory protection.

Notifications to the local health department

- Immediately, but no longer than 48 hours after learning of three or more COVID-19 cases in our workplace, we will contact the local health department for guidance on preventing the further spread of COVID-19 within the workplace.
- We will provide to the local health department the total number of COVID-19 cases and for each COVID-19 case, the name, contact information, occupation, workplace location, business address, the hospitalization and/or fatality status, and North American Industry Classification System code of the workplace of the COVID-19 case, and any other information requested by the local health department. We will continue to give notice to the local health department of any subsequent COVID-19 cases at our workplace.

Additional Consideration #2

Major COVID-19 Outbreaks

This section of CPP will stay in effect until there are no new COVID-19 cases detected in our workplace for a 14-day period.

COVID-19 testing

WUSD sites will provide twice a week COVID-19 testing, or more frequently if recommended by the local health department, to all employees present at our exposed workplace during the relevant 30-day period(s) and who remain at the workplace. COVID-19 testing will be provided at no cost to employees during employees' working hours.

Exclusion of COVID-19 cases

WUSD will ensure COVID-19 cases and employees with COVID-19 exposure are excluded from the workplace in accordance with our CPP **Exclusion of COVID-19 Cases** and **Return to Work Criteria**, and any relevant local health department orders.

Investigation of workplace COVID-19 illnesses

WUSD will comply with the requirements of our CPP Investigating and Responding to COVID-19 Cases.

COVID-19 hazard correction

In addition to the requirements of the district's CPP **Correction of COVID-19 Hazards**, WUSD will take the following actions:

- In buildings or structures with mechanical ventilation, we will filter recirculated air with Minimum Efficiency Reporting Value (MERV) 13 or higher efficiency filters if compatible with the ventilation system. If MERV-13 or higher filters are not compatible with the ventilation system, we will use filters with the highest compatible filtering efficiency. We will also evaluate whether portable or mounted High Efficiency Particulate Air (HEPA) filtration units, or other air cleaning systems would reduce the risk of transmission and implement their use to the degree feasible.
- Administrators will determine the need for a respiratory protection program or changes to an existing respiratory protection program under CCR Title 8 section 5144 to address COVID-19 hazards.
- Administrators will evaluate whether to halt some or all operations at our workplace until COVID-19 hazards have been corrected
- Implement any other control measures deemed necessary by Cal/OSHA.

Notifications to the local health department

We will comply with the requirements of our **Multiple COVID-19 Infections** and **COVID-19 Outbreaks-Notifications to the Local Health Department.**
